Chairperson Ste. Marie opened the meeting at 6:00 p.m.

In Attendance: Chairperson Ste. Marie, Selectman Reardon, Selectperson Mary, Town Administrator Kelley Collins

6:00 p.m. Non Public Session under RSA 91A:3, II (c) Discuss Mrs. LaFrance's taxes

Selectman Reardon made a motion to go into Non Public Session under RSA 91-A:3, II (c) at 6:00 p.m. Selectperson Mary seconded. Roll Call Vote: Chairperson Ste. Marie – yes; Selectman Reardon – yes; Selectperson Mary – yes.

The Board voted unanimously on a payment plan for Mrs. LaFrance.

Selectman Reardon made a motion to leave Non Public Session and seal the minutes at 6:13 p.m. Selectperson Mary seconded. Roll Call Vote: Chairperson Ste. Marie – yes; Selectman Reardon – yes; Selectperson Mary – yes.

Old Business

Review and discuss Highway Department Winter Maintenance, Snow and Ice Removal Policy and sidewalk maintenance

The Board has had a chance to review the Highway Department's Winter Maintenance, Snow and Ice Removal Policy and sidewalk maintenance. There was some discussion regarding which sidewalks were maintained.

Selectperson Mary would like the Road Agent to update the equipment list and to provide a map of the routes. The Town Administrator related some sidewalk maintenance verbiage, which the Board would like incorporated.

The Board will review again at their next meeting and adopt if complete.

New Business

Review and discuss potential cross connection for Greenville Laundromat

The Board reviewed the letter from the owner of the Greenville Laundromat regarding the requirements for the Town's Cross Connection program. Selectman/Water Commissioner Reardon is willing to go out and take a look at the connection with our Project Manager Gerry Curran. They will determine what is required to permanently protect the Town's public water supply from potential cross contamination from the Laundromat's private well.

Review and discuss update to "Allowable Levels of Assistance"

The Board reviewed the Allowable Levels of Assistance, as submitted by the Welfare Director/Town Administrator. She noted that she uses an average for rents between Nashua and Hillsborough County and she uses the allowance for food from the Food Stamp Program.

Selectperson Mary made a motion to accept the Allowable Levels of Assistance, effective immediately. Chairperson Ste. Marie seconded. Motion passed 3-0.

Upon acceptance, should a decision not be reached following the public hearing, adoption of the Plan will stay on the Board's agenda until it is either approved or disapproved.

Anyone needing assistance in attending this hearing should contact the Selectmen's Office one week prior to the hearing.

Chairperson Ste. Marie asked if there were any questions about the plan and noted that the Public Hearing would be left open to run concurrent with our Budget Public Hearing.

7:00 p.m. Public Hearing on 2015 Proposed Warrant and Budget (see separate posted and advertised Notice)

Chairperson Ste. Marie opened the Public Hearing on the 2015 Proposed Warrant and Budget at 7:05 p.m. He began by reading the Town Warrant (please see attached). Chairperson Ste. Marie then went through the General Fund expenditures, revenues as well as Water and Wastewater

Mrs. S. Winslow asked if on Article #14 we can include some language stating that the discontinuation of the road was requested by the landowner. The Town Administrator noted that the Department of Revenue Administration is particular about wording but she will certainly check with them.

Mr. Hartley asked whether we have, or will notice any savings from the closure of Pilgrim's lagoons? Selectperson Mary said it was too early to tell for sure but most of the costs associated with increased treatment was during high flow events such as occur in the Spring and the Fall.

Mrs. K. Washburn would like to talk about the petitioned articles. She noted that a Selectman made a motion last year to curtail discussion of a petitioned article and she thinks it is wrong for Selectmen to make motions on warrant articles. She feels that Selectmen have a right to give their opinions but they should not make motions.

Selectman Reardon stated he was the one who did that and he felt that article did not have anything to do with Town Meeting and should be addressed on the State or Federal level. He disagrees with Mrs. Washburn that it was wrong.

The Town Administrator noted that Selectman Reardon's motion had a second and was passed by a majority of those present and qualified to vote at town meeting. Mrs. Washburn said she didn't care it was wrong.

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned at 8:12 p.m.

To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to NH RSA 35:9-a,II, to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay for capital reserve fund investment management services, and any other expenses incurred, from capital reserve funds income. No vote by the town to rescind such authority shall occur within five years of the original adoption of this article.
- Article 16. By Petition. To request that the Town of Greenville, NH, stand with communities across the country to defend democracy from the corrupting influence of big money in our political system, by calling upon our legislators to amend the United States Constitution to establish that:
 - Only individual human beings are endowed with constitutional rights, and
 - 2) Money is not speech, and therefore regulating political spending is not equivalent to limiting political speech.

And that the People of Greenville, NH hereby instruct our state and federal representatives to enact resolutions and legislation to advance this effort, and to reduce the influence of big money and increase transparency and voter participation in our electoral system.

And that the record of the vote approving this article shall be transmitted by written notice to Greenville's Congressional delegation, and to Greenville's State Legislators, and to the Governor of New Hampshire, and to the President of the United States, informing them of the instructions from their constituents, by the Town Administrator's office within 30 days of the vote

Article 17.

By Petition. Whereas the proposed Northeast Energy Direct (NED) high-pressure natural gas pipeline project is inconsistent with the basic principle of individual property rights, in that, if approved, Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company, LLC – a for-profit corporation – would have the power to force private property owners to give up rights under eminent domain proceedings in order to create a new corridor for the installation of the pipeline project,

and whereas the proposal is inconsistent with the Town's goal of protecting and preserving its aquifers and drinking water, including community and private wells, wetlands, streams, and other bodies of water, in that local water would be extracted, polluted, and reintroduced during drilling or other operations, and in that blasting would affect rock formations essential to maintaining groundwater and wells.

and whereas the town's emergency and maintenance services would be grossly inadequate to cope with the effects of a catastrophic accident involving the pipeline.

The Town of Greenville resolves to oppose approval by the NH Energy Facility Site Evaluation Committee of the construction and installation of a natural gas pipeline by Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company, LLC (a Kinder Morgan Company) as part of the Northeast Energy Direct Project.
