- Article 5. Motion made by Carla and seconded by James Hartley and voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate the sum of Two hundred seventy thousand nine hundred fourteen dollars (\$270,914) for the Water Department.
- Article 6. Motion made by Carla Mary and seconded by James Hartley and voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be placed in existing Capital Reserve Funds established for the purpose listed below:

Article 7. Motion made by James Hartley and seconded by Janice Hartley and voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-five thousand dollars

(\$55,000) to be placed in the following existing Expendable Trust Funds established for those purposes as listed, and further that the Twenty thousand dollars (\$20.000) for the Police Cruiser fund shall come from December 31, 2016 unassigned fund balance:

Article 8. Motion made by Carla Mary and seconded by James Hartley and voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate the sum of One hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to be added to the Water Department Expendable Trust Fund. This sum is to come from the water revenue fund and no amount to be raised by taxation.

- Article 9. Motion made by Carla Mary and seconded by James Hartley and motion made to amend by Marshal Buttrick and Seconded by Peter Simonson and voted in the affirmative as amended to change the wording of this article to the written amount from Forty-two thousand dollars to Forty-three thousand and voted in the affirmative as amended to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-three thousand dollars (\$43,500) for the purpose of reconstructing, repairing and paving town roads with \$43,500 to come from the Highway Block Grant.
- Article 10. Motion made by Carla Mary and seconded by James Hartley and voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000) to maintain and repair the steam boiler (at Town Hall) and any necessary equipment (i.e. condensate pump, tanks, piping, Labor, etc.) in the Town Hall building at 46 Main Street and to update and add electrical outlets to the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's Office and the Chamberlin Free Library and to authorize the withdrawal of Thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000) from the Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund, for this purpose. This will be a non-lapsing article and will not lapse until December 31, 2019.

- Article 11. Motion made by Carla Mary and seconded by James Hartley and voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate the sum of Two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) to continue the planning, studying, design, operation and facility upgrades to include a hypochlorite building, ferric hydroxide pilot study, and NPDES permit review necessary to bring the wastewater treatment facility into compliance with NH DES and EPA discharge permits. Eighty-three thousand dollars (\$83,000) is to come from December 31, 2016 general fund unassigned fund balance; Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) is to come from December 31, 2016 Water Revenues balance with One hundred fifty-seven thousand dollars (\$157,00) to come from taxation. This will be a non-lapsing warrant article and will not lapse until December 31, 2020.
- Article 12. Motion made by James Hartley and seconded by Janice Hartley and voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000) to engineer, test, plan, demolish, repair the retaining wall, mitigate hazardous materials, and do site work for the removal of 23 Main Street, which was taken by the town by tax deed in August 2015 and further to use Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) of December 31, 2016 fund balance for this purpose. This will be a non-lapsing warrant article and will not lapse until December 31, 2020.
- Article 13. Motion made by Carla Mary and seconded by James Hartley and voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to do minor crack repairs, pressure wash, prime and paint the town pool with Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to come from the Pool Expendable Trust Fund and no amount to come from taxation. This will be a non-lapsing warrant article and will not lapse until December 31, 2018.
- Article 14. Motion made by Carla Mary and seconded by Janice Hartley and voted in the affirmative to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28-b, All Veterans' Tax Credit. If adopted, the credit will be available to any resident, or the spouse or surviving spouse of any resident, who (1) served not less than 90 days on active

service in the armed forces of the United States and was honorably discharged or an officer honorably separated from services and is not eligible for or receiving a credit under RSA 72:28 or RSA 72:35. If adopted, the credit granted will be Five hundred dollars (\$500), the same amount as the standard or optional veterans' tax credit voted by the Town under RSA 72:28, in 2005.

Article 15. Motion made by Carla Mary and Seconded by Janice Hartley and voted in the affirmative to modify the provisions of RSA 72:35 the optional tax credit from the current amount of \$1,400 to \$2,000 for a Service-Connected Total Disability on residential property. (Applicant shall provide the town a certification from the United States Department of Veterans' Affairs that the applicant is rated totally and permanently disabled from service connection.)

Mr. Lambert, Moderator asked if anyone had questions or information they would like to share.

Charles Buttrick thanked all the property owners for allowing Eversource to remove trees on the sides of the roads. This cut down the number of falling trees and power wires down in Greenville.

Mike Sadowski asked how a veteran can apply for a veteran's exemption. The Administrator explained the process. The Selectmen's office has the application or go on greenvillenh.org to print an application. The application has to be submitted by April 15th and you need your DD214

Deb Spratt spoke about the Profile committee. The committee is looking for citizens to join. The Profile project will begin in the fall.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One-hundred sixty-two thousand five hundred sixty dollars (\$162,560) for the purchase of a loader for use by the Highway Department, with Seventeen thousand (\$17,000) to come from the trade value of the Town's 1997 Hyundai Loader; Twenty-nine thousand (29,000) to come from the Loader/Backhoe Expendable Trust Fund; Six thousand (\$6,000) to come from the Public Works Equipment Capital Reserve Fund; Five Thousand (\$5,000) to come from December 31, 2017 Water Revenues balance; Five Thousand (\$5,000) to come from December 31, 2017 Wastewater Revenues balance; and to authorize the issuance of not more than Eighty-two thousand seven hundred (\$82,700) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of

the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; and further to raise and appropriate Seventeen thousand eight hundred sixty (\$17,860) for the first year payment.

Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2/3 ballot vote required).

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-three thousand five hundred dollars (\$33,500) for the purchase and installation of equipment for the Fire Department's conversion to high-band radio for emergency communications, to include, but not limited to, tower hardware, truck radios, and portable units. This will be a non-lapsing warrant article and will not lapse until December 31, 2019.

Recommended by the Board of Selectmen

Article 13. To see if the town will enter into a three year intermunicipal agreement for the provision of police services pursuant to RSA 53-A between the towns of Greenville and Temple on such terms and conditions as specified in the contract.

We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

The Town of Greenville has not presented a management's discussion and analysis. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America have determined that the management's discussion and analysis is necessary to supplement, but is not required to be part of, the basic financial statements.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Greenville's basic financial statements. The combining nonmajor and individual general fund schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The combining nonmajor and individual general fund schedules are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining nonmajor and individual general fund schedules are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

In 2017, our office saw a lot of change with the promotion of Tara Sousa to Town Administrator and the hiring of Kelly Fitzwater as the new Bookkeeper/Administrative Assistant. We thank Kelley Collins for her years of dedicated service, and wish her the best in her new position. We also welcomed Scott Tenney to fill the vacancy on the Board.

The following are some of the highlights for 2017:

- Completed the replacement of the raw and finished water pumps at the Water Treatment Plant using SRF funding, including \$29,000 of principal forgiveness, and water revenue fund balance.
- Completed the construction and interconnection of a building to store and feed hypochlorite at the Wastewater Treatment facility.
- Completed, with promising results, the first round a ferric hydroxide pilot designed to address aluminum levels in our wastewater discharge, as well as a river study, with the goal of achieving compliance with new or revised NPDES discharge permit limits.
- Completed camera inspection of the remaining areas of the sewer collection system, and contracted a major excavation repair on Temple Road identified through this proactive program.
- Completed the minor crack repair, pressure washing, and most of the painting at the Town Pool. This warrant article approved work will continue in 2018, with the painting of lines and other detail work delayed by uncooperative weather.
- Supported the expansion of services for our youth population, including the return of swimming lessons, and new arts and crafts programs and events.
- At the request of the Town Clerk, our staff collaborated with her department and the Treasurer to create procedures for the acceptance of credit cards for motor vehicle registrations, to begin in January of 2018.
- Completed the demolition and reclamation of the tax deeded property at 23 Main Street.

We had several additional new hires in 2017. Please join us in welcoming:

The Beautification Committee is a group of volunteer residents who are committed to improving Greenville by planting flowers and other improvement projects. We thank the Select Board for supporting us financially and verbally.



We were particularly encouraged by welcoming a number of new committee members who were active in our projects. The committee had two major projects this year. The maintenance of thirteen flower beds/stations spread around town and the Greenville Holiday Tree Lighting & Celebration. We decorated Town Hall with window candles, greenery and wreaths, as well as, the bridge boxes, and the Police Station with greenery and a wreath. Despite

CHAMBERLIN FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

2017 was another excellent year for our library. We circulated 16,042 items to 13,013 patrons.

Eighty-three library cards were issued to new patrons this year.

Our web site tallied over 23,000 visits.

Our online genealogy databases were accessed over 2,500 times by our patrons.

We processed 911 incoming interlibrary loans and 881 outgoing interlibrary loans.

We added 661 new items to our collection, broken down as follows:

In 2017, we hosted 111 programs that were attended by 1112 Greenville residents. Of special note were two programs presented by Marshall Buttrick on Greenville history, "The Changing Face of Main Street" and a program on the exquisite carving and woodwork of Greenville resident Pete Pelletier. We also hosted, in conjunction with the Greenville Holiday Committee, the annual Greenville Christmas Tree Lighting. We also had an excellent turnout for the rare eclipse of the Sun on August 21, where the library director furnished three telescopes for residents to safely view the event.

We have replaced our aging, rusted outdoor library drop box with a factory reconditioned, stainless steel one at a cost savings of 50% over a new one. Utilizing funding from our income generating sources, such as overdue fines and donations, the drop box was purchased at no cost to the taxpayers of Greenville.

We also replaced seven old office and patron computers. All of them were well past their normal useful life. Again, these were factory reconditioned units with full warranties and were purchased at no cost to the taxpayers.

The library received two programming grants from the State of New Hampshire this year. The NH Council for the Humanities funded two programs in the Humanities-to-Go series – "New England Quilts and the Stories They Tell", presented by Pamela Weeks, and "Moved and Seconded: Town Meeting in New Hampshire", presented by Rebecca Rule.

With great sadness, we say farewell to one of our outstanding librarians. After nearly twenty-one years of service to the library, Brenda Cassidy has decided to retire. She has been an integral part of this library and will be missed. Fortunately for us, though, Brenda has consented to act as a substitute when needed.

We would like to welcome our newest part-time librarian, Courtney Caisse. Courtney has an extensive background in many aspects of librarianship and will be a valuable addition to our staff.

PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board is proud to submit its 2017 Town Report to the citizens of Greenville. The Planning Board is the local land use board charged with overseeing and implementing Greenville's long and short term planning goals and to build consensus among the Town's residents and businesses on the future direction of the community. The Board and their staff strive to implement the Town's vision for a community that is both economically and environmentally sustainable.

The Greenville Planning Board is made up of five members who are appointed by the Board of Selectmen with staggering three-year terms. Current members include Edward White, Chairman; members Michael Sadowski, Miles Horsley & Rob Duval, BOS Ex-Officio Scott Tenney and one vacancy. The Board meets on the second Thursday of each month with additional meetings held at the call of the Chairman. The Board employs a part-time Administrative Assistant.

Primary functions of the Planning Board include:

- 1. Assistance and management with all land use and development inquiries and review.
- 2. Manages the growth and change within the community.
- 3. Drafts revisions to town ordinances and regulations with final approval by town residents.
- 4. Reviews all residential and commercial development proposals and assists applicants with the development review process.
- Has complete oversight of the Master Plan to ensure implementation of the Town's long range planning and goals. The Master Plan is updated once every ten years through extensive input at public meetings.
- 6. Economic development with Commercial, Industrial and small business.

Some highlights for 2017 Planning Board activity included:

 Public Hearing conducted on January 12, 2017 concerning the adoption of the Temporary Ancillary Sale Ordinance (yard, garage, moving sales and flea market ordinance), adoption of the International Property Maintenance Code

- 2009 ver. Ordinance, and Amendment to the Greenville Ordinance E Section I (Building Code Ordinance).
- 2. On January 26, 2017, the Planning Board was presented with a conceptual design of a transfer station solid waste facility for Shaw's Recycling/Money for Metals.
- 3. Public Hearing held in July with final approval granted for a Non-Residential Site Plan to Greater Waste Solutions for a Solid Waste Collection, Storage, Transfer facility & Scrap Metal Collection and Recycling Center.
- 4. Several meetings conducted throughout the year with Lisa Murphy, Southwest Regional Planning Commission representative on a proposed revision to the Town of Greenville's Master Plan.
- 5. Streamlined the Planning Board procedures and created a new and improved Site Plan Checklist.
- 6. Attendance by the Planning Board and staff at the 2017 Right to Know Workshop in September for updates to the legislative changes to the Chapter 234 & Chapter 165: A Guide to Open Government. This training covered topics on Wireless Facilities, Procedural Basics for Planning & Zoning Boards & Water Quality, Water Protection & Water Management.
- 7. Initiated preliminary discussions on revisions to the Town of Greenville's current zoning ordinances.
- 8. Held a joint meeting in November with the Board of Selectmen & Police Chief concerning Route 31 Traffic & Safety concerns.

The Planning Board would like to extend special thanks to long term Planning Board member Ted de Winter who resigned in March for his many years of service to the Town and also to Patrick Reardon for his time and commitment on the Board.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment had an unusually busy year, hearing three separate matters. In June, a Main Street property owner sought a variance from Section 2.7.2 b1 of the zoning ordinance, which prohibits ground floor dwelling units in multi-story buildings in the Downtown District. Upon strong opposition voiced by abutters and town residents at the public hearing, the applicant opted to withdraw his application without decision from the Board. In August, the ZBA heard an appeal of an Administrative Decision of the Code Enforcement Officer filed by an abutter to a property which had been determined to be in compliance with zoning regulations, maintaining its approved status as a two family residence. Over the course of multiple meetings, the Board ordered a confirmatory inspection, and later upheld the decision of the Code Enforcement Officer. Lastly, in October, the ZBA presided over a variance request regarding Appendix A-2 (b) of the zoning ordinance, which requires frontage on a Town approved Class V or better road or street for the construction of a single family building. The Board found that the applicant had failed to meet 4 of the 5 required criteria for granting such, and subsequently denied the variance. The Zoning Board of Adjustment thanks the community for its participation in these important public hearings.

Due to the abnormal number of hearings and resultant legal consultation costs, the Zoning Board substantially over-expended its 2017 budget. As the number of cases heard is believed to be an anomaly, the 2018 budget proposal seeks to fully fund one hearing.

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BUILDING DEPARTMENT BUILDING INSPECTOR / CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

In reviewing 2017, construction activity within the town decreased overall from that of 2016. This year saw little activity, with a combination of residential and some commercial building construction being the major outcome. This unfortunately has not been consistent with the increase in the construction industry throughout the state and nation.

There were only a handful of new homes built this year, with two of the three being new manufactured homes. The vast majority of the building permits that were issued were for additions to properties and renovations of buildings. There were a few more Code Enforcement cases handled by this office than in previous years, with a few of those cases being brought before the Greenville Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Once again, I would very much like to thank everyone at Town Hall for all of their help and assistance with the day to day operations.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Greenville Emergency Management in 2017 completed the Emergency Operations Plan. We would like to thank all the departments that contributed to this plan. With the main Emergency Operations Plan completed we are currently working on the Hazard Materials Annex of this plan. Members of Emergency Management are currently working on obtaining Level I and Level II of the New Hampshire Emergency Management Academy.

On October 30 2017 the town and State of New Hampshire experienced flooding conditions. The State of New Hampshire gathered information from all towns within the state and applied for a Presidential Declaration to obtain federal funding. Greenville met with the NH Emergency Management representative and FEMA to review all damages in the town. Hillsborough County did not qualify for this declaration.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

This past year we were fortunate enough to have favorable weather conditions in the spring and summer which limited the amount of wildland fire activity throughout the state. September and October saw fire conditions change and the state was faced with some difficult fires. The Dilly Cliff fire in North Woodstock was one of the most challenging fires we have seen in New Hampshire. Steep terrain and extreme fire behavior made this fire difficult to fight. It lasted for over 3 weeks and the final hotspots in inaccessible terrain were extinguished by heavy rains. Your local fire departments and the Division of Forests & Lands worked throughout the year to protect homes and the forests. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on high fire danger days. Our fire lookouts are credited with keeping many fires small due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire detection efforts were supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger was especially high.

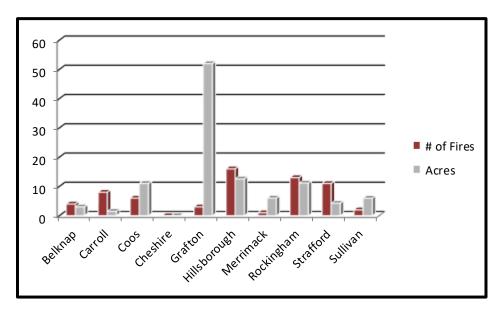
Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2017 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

As we prepare for the 2018 fire season, please remember to contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a fire permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire permits are also available online in most towns and may be obtained by visiting www.NHfirepermit.com. The burning of household waste is prohibited by the Air Resources Division of the Department of Environmental Services (DES). You are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 603-271-3503 or www.des.nh.gov for more information. Safe open burning requires your diligence and responsibility. WATER DEPARTMENT AND WASTEWATER DEPARTMENT

Utility Partners had continued into its first year of a new 5 year Water and Wastewater Operations-Contract for the Town of Greenville, New Hampshire, which started on January 1, 2017.

Water Treatment and Distribution

In 2017 there were major upgrades at the water treatment plant with the replacement of both finished and raw water pumps, and improvements to the raw water pump building. UP staff also replaced the thousand-gallon bulk chlorine tank and cleared out trees growing in the power lines going from the raw water pump station to the water treatment plant.

In the distribution system, the staff repaired a 16-inch water main that was leaking in the parking lot of the Highway Department and a leaking 2-inch water service piping supplying the residents on 31 High Street.

The Town continued replacing water meters to acquire the most accurate water usage throughout the water system. Curb-boxes and gate boxes were repaired when found to be damaged and prior to the Town's and the NHDOT's paving events.

Adam and Barrett Hill tanks were cleaned and inspected with a tank mixer installed in the Adam Hill tank.

Annual Spring and Fall Hydrant flushing was completed by UP staff and repaired one hydrant on Pleasant Street.

Wastewater Collection and Treatment

UP Staff assisted Osprey-Owl with a WWTP River Pilot Study to track and measure aluminum levels and the impact on the river aluminum wastewater treatment plant discharge. UP staff also assisted in the engineering pilot study of ferric chloride to replace epic 1100 as a coagulant. The pilot study was successful in reducing the amount of aluminum removed from the wastewater treatment plant effluent but increased copper levels. The chemical feed building for chlorine and caustic has been completed and is in operation.

Eastern Pipe Services (EPS) was on site in May to clean and camera Greenville Falls, Ashton Place, High Street, Temple Street, RT 45, Mill Street, and Ashton Place Easement. EPS also pumped out a large amount of grit from the Wastewater Treatment Plant raw water inlet channel. The total sewer lines cleaned and cameraed was 3518 feet. In October Accura Construction repaired a sewer line off-set house service at 30 Temple Street.

WELFARE DEPARTMENT

According to State Statute (RSA 165:1) "Whenever a person in any town is poor and unable to support himself, he shall be relieved and maintained by the overseers of public welfare of such town, whether or not he has a residence there." Living up to this mandate is always a challenge for a Town our size.

Statistically, we had 27 appointments for welfare in 2017, which is down 34% from the 41 appointments for assistance in 2016. Of the 26 appointments, 21 were new clients in 2016, three applicants were denied assistance, and 3 applicants failed to produce requested documentation. Four clients asked for assistance more than once in 2017. The Town paid rent, or part of a month's rent, 15 times. We provided food vouchers to 4 families. We assisted 8 families with their electric bill and we provided burial assistance for 4 individuals. We also provided some limited heating, transportation, and other miscellaneous assistance. When appropriate, applicants were referred to other agencies for assistance.

State Statute (RSA 165:28) requires that if assistance is rendered to a person who owns real estate, a lien shall be placed on that real estate. In 2017, a lien in the amount of \$394.90 was collected and discharged. RSA 165:19 requires that "The relation of any poor person in the line of father, mother, stepfather, stepmother, son, daughter, husband or wife shall assist or maintain such person when in need of relief." RSA 165:4-a also allows the Town to apply any welfare assistance, that is approved for an applicant, to be paid to the Town Tax Collector if the landlord has past due property taxes, water or sewer bills to the Town.

I am happy to report that, hopefully due to improving economic conditions, welfare expenditures were down this year, and we finished the year 43.55% under budget. Mindful that welfare needs can shift substantially year-to-year, I can only recommend a conservative 5% reduction in the 2018 budget.

I wish to thank Carrie Traffie for serving as Deputy Welfare Director during my transition to this new role, and express my gratitude to her and Kelley Collins for their wisdom and guidance throughout the year. I also wish to thank the volunteers of our local Society of St. Vincent de Paul for the aid they provide to the less fortunate in our community, and all the donors who make their work possible.

I appreciate the opportunity to serve the community as Welfare Director, and I will continue to do what I can to balance the need for assistance with the prudent management of the budget. Thank you for your continued support.

The Souhegan Valley Ambulance Service, Inc. (SVAS) is a non-profit emergency medical transport service which was organized on September 1, 1972. We serve the towns of New Ipswich and Greenville.

In 2017 SVAS had an increase of slightly more than 14% over 2016. In the year 2017, SVAS responded to approximately 594 calls for aid as well as providing stand-by ambulance coverage for community events and fire stand by.

In an effort to increase the level of care that an EMT can provide, SVAS hosted an Advanced-EMTclass. If you are an EMT in our community who wish to join the ambulance service and become a member, please contact us. SVAS anticipates hosting an EMT class in the summer of 2018. Our EMT's continue to show dedication to our community as they provide a high quality of care to the patients we serve.

Our EMT's stay up to date on protocol changes and new techniques by attending classes and continued education. Each must recertify their licenses and maintain certifications with the constant evolution in state protocols and national standards. Our members spend many hours on emergency calls, maintaining equipment as well as other administrative tasks while on duty at the bay.

Recently we changed the on duty (per diem) hours of some of our staffing. While we always provide on call coverage 7 days a week 24 hours a day, we changed the per diem hours which will allow 2 EMT's to remain on duty at the ambulance bay and available to respond immediately from 8AM-4PM Monday through Friday. This change will allow the ambulance to respond immediately when calls come in and allow them to get to the emergency quicker.

SVAS purchased (2) new pieces of equipment in 2017 called Lucas2. These devices will assist us in providing more efficient and effective treatment during cardiac arrests by providing mechanical chest compressions. This will free up the EMT's from exhaustion and allow them to provide other life- saving treatments.

For those members of the community who are not familiar with us or the role of the ambulance in an emergency feel free to contact us. As always, we thank the New Ipswich and Greenville Fire Departments, as well as the New Ipswich and Temple/Greenville Police Departments and our members for their continued support and assistance. Without teamwork and dedication from all departments, our jobs would be much harder.

We would like to reach out and thank the New Ipswich Department of Public works as they have provided much support over the year especially making sure we can get out in the winter weather.

### **Souhegan River Local Advisory Committee (SoRLAC)**

The purpose of the Rivers Management and Protection Program, established in 1988 and defined in RSA 483, is to protect certain New Hampshire rivers, called designated rivers, for their outstanding natural and cultural resources. The Souhegan is one of those rivers. The program is administered by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services and uses a two-tier approach to manage and protect rivers at the state and local levels through the advisement of Local River Management Advisory Committees (LACs).

Work being done within a quarter mile of the Souhegan River is looked at by the SoRLAC at its regular monthly meeting and recommendations are made permitting by the state. Each of the six corridor towns has room for these members who are nominated by the BOS. Greenville is presently represented by Marshall Buttrick – there is an opening for two more interested citizens. Meetings are informal and anyone is invited to attend. Minutes and agendas may be posted at http:www.nashupc.org/about/related-organizations/sorlac.

SoRLAC reviewed four constructions permits and made recommendations to benefit the river. SoRLAC monitored the EPA cleanup at the Fletcher Paint site in Milford and obtained a small canoe access at the park. We also participated in the Wilton Sustainability Fair and attended the statewide LAC workshop in Concord. We work in cooperation with the Souhegan Watershed Association on cleanups along the river, canoe trips, water quality monitoring during the summer months – weekly at Watson Park, and the Adopt a Salmon Family program in Wilton and Milford Schools.

The Souhegan River this season stayed in relatively good shape. Water quality was good and the river recovered nicely from the sustained drought the previous year. This data is available on the SWA site at <a href="www.souheganriver.org">www.souheganriver.org</a>. All NH designated rivers have requirements for protection of instream flow beginning this year – the Souhegan was proud to be one of the two rivers chosen as the pilot program for the state several years ago.

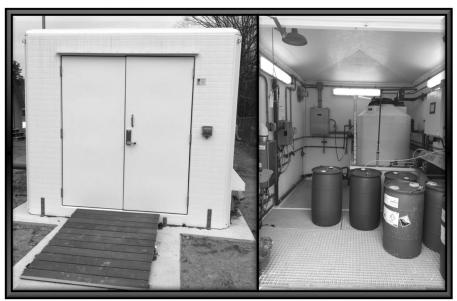
